BAS Visit to Hauser and Wirth

In September Debbie Hillyerd of Hauser and Wirth gave a group of 20 BAS members an excellent and informative tour of Bruton's stunning new contemporary art gallery and gardens. She showed us Phyllida Barlow's highly inventive sculptural pieces made in response to the surrounding landscape and architecture. They are of monumental size, in ordinary materials such as sheets of plywood, cardboard, rags, rubber, and polystyrene. Barlow started recycling materials at the age of six in post-war Britain, improvising her dolls-house from boxes, and went on to become an art professor at the Slade for over 30 years. She loves 'mess, absurdity, precariousness and chance'. And the restaurant cafe is a wonderful place for lunch, or just a cup of tea!
