Once again this has been a positive year for the Bruton Art Society, despite the effects of Covid-19. We have, unfortunately, had to postpone a large part of our programme, including our Annual Exhibition. But this has spurred us on to hold our first online exhibition, which has been much appreciated. Work submitted certainly sustained our reputation for showing art of high quality. In this Newsletter there is a report on the exhibition, and on the pictures which received most votes in our popular choice. Our membership has continued to grow and is now hovering around the 220 mark - higher than ever before, I believe, in the history of the society.

It is good to see that we have been able to partly resume our programme. Earlier this month there was a well-attended painting day at Knowle Rock, thanks to the generosity of Corinna Leigh-Turner. Some of the paintings resulting from the visit appear in this Newsletter. We have also resumed our workshop programme, with a nuno felting session run by Helen Baddeley.

As the situation caused by Covid-19 is still so volatile, we cannot at this point make further firm arrangements. But we are keeping the situation under observation and will do what we can when we can.

We are very sorry to have to announce that, owing to the current situation, we have had to cancel our Christmas Party and Lecture. I am pleased to let you know that the lecturer, James Russell (who gave us such an excellent talk on Ravilious a couple of years ago) has agreed to lecture to us for Christmas 2021.

Let us hope that by that time we will once more be running a full programme.

Bruton Art Society 67th Annual Exhibition

Congratulations to everyone who submitted work for our Annual Exhibition Online.

From all the lovely comments that have come in by email & word of mouth, I think we can say it has been successful & really appreciated by many people, at a time when we all needed something positive to look forward to. It would have been so easy to cancel the whole thing as many other similar art organisations have done this year.

For myself, it was a steep learning curve - receiving digital pictures from artist members and working out how to put selected images in a viewable form on the website, but I'm pleased to say it works a treat & all done at minimal expense to the Society.

An overview of website statistics during the first 4 weeks of the exhibition were very encouraging with an estimated 15,000 page views! Most visitors were from UK but a smaller number from USA & elsewhere Interestingly enough the statistics show visitor ages to be: 60% 18-34, 27% 35-54, & only 11% were over 54! The exhibition will stay in place for the autumn.


Artist Profile - Will Vaughan

Will Vaughan our chairman since 2012 retired from his position as Professor of the History of Art at Birkbeck College, London, in 2006. It was then that he and his wife Pek Peppin came to leave their London home to live full-time in their ancient fifteenth-century farmhouse, Cockhill, outside Castle Cary. They had bought the property in a dilapidated state in 1982 and had been painstakingly restoring it in accordance with the guidance of English Heritage during their vacations.

In his wide-ranging career as an Art Historian Will came to specialise in German Romanticism (Caspar David Friedrich) and the work of the English Romantic and friend of William Blake, Samuel Palmer. In fact William's fascination with the work of Palmer did not end with his retirement. The year before, in 2005 he had curated a major exhibition on Palmer, Vision and Landscape for the British Museum, but on retirement his commitment continued as he worked on what remains the most complete and definitive study of Palmer, Shadows on the Wall, published in 2015.

Will's interest in Palmer goes back a long way. His physician father died when he was only seven and his mother, who had trained at Chelsea School of Art, settled in Oxford where he went to Magdalen College School. There he showed a talent for drawing and art history and on visiting the Ashmolean came across Palmer's sepia prints which he remembers made a great impression on him. He then started an Art course at the Ruskin School of Art at Oxford, but decided to move to the Courtauld Institute in London to specialise in Art History, a move that launched him on his academic career.

Being an artist and being an art historian do not easily go together, but in Will's case they have once the pressures of academic life were over when he and Pek settled in Castle Cary. It was then that he decided to take up etching seriously. To do this he felt he needed proper training from someone who really knew how to do it and on joining Bruton Art Society he was introduced to the techniques and skills needed by Bridget Moreton. Since then he has been producing fine sets of etchings and has exhibited regularly at The Bath Society of Artists, The Royal West of England Academy (Bristol), The New English Art Club (London) and the Royal Society of British Artists (London).

Will feels his work has been both inspired and influenced by Samuel Palmer. It is not that he is in any sense copying Palmer's work, but more that he feels an affinity of mood and an appreciation of sunset, low light, silhouettes and the end of the day and the emotions that they give rise to. At times he feels, when an etching is going well, it is almost as if Palmer were watching him.

At the same time Will is happy to explore new ways of producing etchings, in particular the use of special dry point plastic sheets which are both much cheaper and easier to use than conventional metal plates, This is a new technology which might attract others of us to follow the etching path.


BAS Online Exhibition 2020 - The Popular Vote

Gerry Dudgeon Across the Water (Equal 1st)

This painting uses acrylic glazes to depict the wide expanse of water on the Dart Estuary near Dittisham. There are vertical accents which mark the channel for boating and the blues and yellows evoke the glow of evening.




I try to paint in an impressionistic way trying to capture light and the fragility and beauty of flowers. In order to do this I use the white of the paper and mainly transparent colours and almost always mix my colours directly on the paper. For me painting flowers is just pure joy.





Sue Hardy ASGFA My Friend the Goatherd (Equal 2nd)

The surprising armful of kids are off to the field with the entourage; a disappointed dog must wait behind. This was a lovely subject for a narrative drawing in earth colours & my own experience of keeping goats really helped.



I painted this oil on location between Shaftesbury and Wilton. The ridge of the hills is where the old drovers track runs between these two towns.


I particularly liked the blue shadows and the hazy light. The sky also had a wonderful quality of light to it. The vibrant green was such a contrast the whole scene was irresistible.

An abstract interpretation of the Dart Estuary in Devon with the suggestion of a pink-sailed boat to the left of centre. Banks of trees come down to the water's edge, and acrylic glazing in blue and bluegreen conveys the element of water.
